

MONDAY

1. At forty years of age, after receiving the best possible education in Egypt, Moses was presumptuous and thought that his ability was sufficient to do justice for the people of Israel. However, his own strength could not accomplish God's will. By acting on his own, without the Lord's command, he was pursued by Pharaoh and had to isolate himself in the wilderness (Exodus 2:11-15).

2. Man is foolish and trusts in his own skill. We think we can do God's work by ourselves or preach the gospel through our own merits. However, if the Lord does not authorize us, if He Himself does not send us, it is useless to try to accomplish something by natural strength. He Himself does God's work, and man has no skillwhatsoever if he does not receive His authority. We are totally dependent on God (Acts 7:23-24).

3. Upon encountering an Egyptian mistreating a Hebrew, Moses was overcome by emotion and killed him, taking justice into his own hands. When our judgments are based on emotions and natural skills, our justice is never impartial. The true Judge is the Lord: He judges, and we must simply obey His command (Acts 7:26-27).

4. "The spirit of man was created from the Spirit of God and has the same spiritual and eternal nature as His. Our human spirit does not die. It is the deepest part of our being, the organ through which we contact God. It is through the spirit that we receive everything that comes from Him, for everything that comes from God is spiritual (Ecclesiastes 3:11)." (Daily Food, Book 1, Week 1, Monday, p. 6).

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TUESDAY

1. In the past, there were many people in our churches who stood out for their oratory, eloquence, and biblical knowledge, but who were unable to put the word into practice. When God communicates His word to us, He demands that we practice it, that we execute it. It is useless to make beautiful speeches if we do not live the word of the Lord. We need to be balanced: to hear the word and transmit it diligently, but also to be faithful executors of God's commands (Ezekiel 33:32, KJVA).

2. We need to be diligent in putting the Lord's word into practice, not treating it merely as fine speech. As soon as we hear it and recognize that it comes from God, we cannot waste time doubting it before putting it into practice. God's words reveal His will, and if we do not carry out His commands when He gives them, we lose the opportunity He grants us to fulfill His will (Ezekiel 33:32).

3. We need to receive the word, first of all, for ourselves, putting it into practice in our own lives. It is no use enjoying the Lord's words as one appreciates beautiful words, because if that word is not being practiced and transforming our lives, how can we be used to transform the lives of others as well? (Ezekiel 33:32).

4. "Man is not capable of governing and subduing this Earth by himself. Therefore, God made him as a vessel to contain God Himself. He is the one who has the power to establish a government over the Earth, and not man himself. God did not make us capable of governing the Earth, but made us as vessels to contain Him who is able" (2 Corinthians 4:7). (Daily Food, book 11, week 1, Tuesday, p. 8)

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WEDNESDAY

1. During the first part of his life, Moses relied heavily on his human skill; he thought he was already ready and mature enough to lead the children of Israel out of Egypt. However, when he relied on his natural capacity to accomplish this task, he realized that his own strength was not enough. If God does not go before us, sending us and granting us authority and power, it is useless to consider ourselves capable. Everything depends on God! (Exodus 2:11-14).

2. Long after Moses' flight to the desert, the Lord heard the cry of the children of Israel and remembered the covenant He had made with their ancestors. When God enters the scene, the situation changes! Moses' heroic acts and human strength were of no use in freeing the people, for the Lord had not yet decided to intervene. God, however, did not forget His people; in due time, He Himself would deliver them from Egypt (Exodus 2:23-25; 3:11).

3. During the forty years Moses lived in the desert, he spent most of his time tending his father-in-law's flocks and, due to lack of practice, lost the fluency he possessed in speaking. This is what God often does with us: while we trust in our own skill and zeal, He cannot use us fully. So, He allows our strength to be exhausted so that His strength may be manifested and He may reveal Himself to us, just as He did with Moses (Exodus 3:1-2).

4. "God created us to receive His life. Man only needed to choose the tree of life, but he made the wrong choice and became this old man, corrupted by deception. [...] But God has not given up on man! His plan of salvation is complete! He has salvation for each of the three parts of our being: body, soul, and spirit" (Ephesians 4:22). (Daily Food, book 11, week 1, Wednesday, p. 11)

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THURSDAY

1.To lead the people of Israel out of Egypt and into Canaan, God needed to raise up a leader who was not only humanly skilled, but who knew God and obeyed Him. This is the kind of leader the Lord seeks. Thus, after forty years in the wilderness, having lost his self-confidence, Moses understood that he had been chosen to liberate the people from Egypt (Acts 7:35; Exodus 3:10).

2. Although Moses was used by God as an instrument to deliver His people, the power was not in him. We are instruments in the Lord's hands, but by ourselves we cannot accomplish His work. However, when He sends us, everything changes, for He grants us authority and power, since we have the assistance of Christ (Acts 7:34-36).

3. The end of Moses' life was marked by profound trust in God. He did not rely on his own skill, but on the Lord's faithfulness and the identity he had with Him. In the same way, for us to be useful to God, we need to trust Him fully, without relying on our own abilities. Like Moses, we also need to be identified with the One who sends us (Deuteronomy 34:7; Exodus 3:12).

4. "Thus, Jesus satisfied the demands of God's righteousness, for He became righteousness for us, because He shed His blood, signifying that there was death and that the price was paid. He also satisfied the demand of God's holiness. And finally, He met the demand of God's glory. Now, the way to the tree of life is reopened for me and for you" (John 3:16). (Daily Food, book 11, week 1, Thursday, p. 13)

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FRIDAY

1. Moses was a faithful servant who cared for God's people and house completely. God had full freedom to act through him and was able to use him greatly to accomplish His will because Moses was faithful and totally one with the Lord. This is a quality we also need to learn (Hebrews 3:2-5; Numbers 12:7).

2. Today God is sending us to conquer the whole Earth! We need to take hold of the authority that accompanies this sending and go out into the streets with boldness. We need to empower churches, raise up more missionaries, and nurture the formation of teenagers. We cannot look at our own weakness or limitations, for the Lord Himself has sent us and goes before us (Judges 6:14-16).

3. Just as Samson was set apart from the womb to deliver the people of Israel from the Philistines, our teenagers, though still very young, are also Nazirites, consecrated to the Lord. Therefore, we need to take care of these boys and girls; they will bring the Lord back! (Judges 13:3-7, 17-18).

4. "Thanks to Christ's redemption, man has once again become able to receive the life of God through His word. It is the life of God that transforms man, and not mere theoretical teachings. Therefore, we need to immerse ourselves in the word daily so that our souls may be saved" (John 17:17). (Daily Food, book 11, week 1, Friday, p. 16).

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SATURDAY

1. The burning bush that Moses saw represents the condition of man after the fall, subject to the curse. We were useless to God, but He sent His only begotten Son to redeem us. Today, He wants to use us despite our fallen nature, and we have the honor of participating in His work, even though we are only like a bush in which He has placed the flame of His glory and holiness (Genesis 3:17-18; Hebrews 9:11-14).

2. God created us as vessels, channels for the accomplishment of His work. He does not need our natural skills as fuel, for He Himself is the Almighty God; we are merely vessels that support the manifestation of His glory (Genesis 2:7).

3. We are earthen vessels, but we carry within us a precious treasure: the glory of God! Our sufficiency comes from Him, and through it we have been enabled to be ministers of a new covenant, not of the letter, but of the Spirit. The letter still belongs to the realm of human capacity, but it is the Spirit who has the power, and it is to Him that we must give full freedom to act (2 Corinthians 3:5; 4:7).

4. "Studying theology will not transform the soul, but rather contact with the living word, with the present-day speaking of the Lord. We need to diligently listen to His voice and instill His word in our hearts" (Deuteronomy 6:6-7). (Daily Food, book 11, week 1, Saturday, p. 17).

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SUNDAY

1. When a man considers himself highly capable, he becomes presumptuous and begins to think he does not need the Word. God cannot use someone in this condition. If we were to lose access to the prophetic word, we would be lost, and the Lord's work would cease. Therefore, we need to love and value it, not as mere theory, but as a practical reality in our lives (Deuteronomy 8:3).

2. Through the redemptive work of Christ, today we can enter the Holy of Holies, drawing near to the throne of grace, where we contemplate the holiness of God. We can access His presence at any time, wherever we are, for it is no longer restricted to a physical place, but can be enjoyed in our spirit (Hebrews 4:16).

3. When God revealed Himself to Moses and sent him on his mission, He assured him that He would certainly be with him. The presence of the Lord, the very I AM, is what gives us the security to carry out His work. If the Lord sends us, let us move forward with confidence, trusting in His authority, and conquer the Earth for Him! (Exodus 3:12-15).

4. "Just as gold needs to be subjected to extremely high temperatures to become pure, we also need trials [...] these situations served to show what was really inside. In the same way, sufferings purify and reveal the state of our faith, separating impurities from pure faith. With each trial experienced, faith is refined, becoming purer and more valuable" (1 Peter 1:7). (Daily Food, book 11, week 1, Sunday, p. 19)
