

MONDAY

1. God desires to remove from us the vices and errors of the church in Sardis so that, in our generation, He may have the reality of the church in Philadelphia. This is a church that has little strength, but it has an open door before it. He who has the key of David is the One who opens the door, and no one shuts, and he who shuts, no one can open it (Rev 3:7-8).

2. In Ezekiel 33, God tells the prophet that in every city there would be sentinels, watchmen, and lookouts, whose function was to identify dangers and warn the people. If they failed to do so, they would be held responsible. Likewise, we must be spiritual sentinels, sensitive to the Word of God and committed to proclaiming it, so that all may practice it as the Lord speaks (Ezekiel 33:1-7 KJV).

3. We are in the position of sentinels or watchmen. Therefore, we need to watch over all of God's people, guard the citadel, and look far ahead. We must also be attentive to the signs of the times that point to the Lord's return and notify God's people (1 Peter 5:8; Luke 21:34-35; Ezekiel 33:7 KJV).

4. "God loved Jacob because he loved God's will, he loved what God loved. Jacob valued the birthright, the promises, and the blessing that God had given to Abraham and Isaac. God loved and chose Jacob because he loved what was in God's heart. You may be a person with many flaws and failings, but if you love what God loves, you are blessed!" (Romans 9:13) (Daily Bread, book 10, week 4, Monday, p. 57).

TUESDAY

1. Our eyes must be the eyes of the Spirit, the eyes of faith. Therefore, the way to be faithful sentinels or watchmen to the Lord, alerting all of God's people, is to remain attentive to His Word (Ezekiel 33:7, KJA).

2. We cannot be insensitive to the Lord's words. Let us be sensitive to His Word, His eyes, and His feelings. May our hearts always be willing to hear His voice and obey what He tells us (John 10:27; Psalm 95:7-8a).

3. The Lamb has seven eyes and seven horns, which are the seven Spirits of God. We need to look into His eyes. Often, the eyes express the deepest feelings of the heart, even more than words themselves. Therefore, we must have attentive ears to His speaking and our eyes fixed on Him as He speaks to us. These are the true sentinels: those who watch, contemplating the Lord and discerning what is in His heart (Revelation 5:6b; Hebrews 12:2a).

4. "The vision that should guide us is the will of God. And what is His will? His will is "that in the dispensation of the fullness of the times He might gather together in one all things in Christ, both which are in heaven and which are on earth—in Him." (Ephesians 1:10). Time exists so that God's will may be fulfilled. In the fullness of time, God will make Christ the Head over all things. This is the eternal will of God!" (Daily Food, book 10, week 4, Tuesday, p. 59).

WEDNESDAY

1. In Ezekiel 33:21, we see the announcement of the fall of Jerusalem. The city fell exactly as Ezekiel had prophesied. For a long time, the false prophets had spoken only pleasing words to satisfy the people and gain popularity. However, at the moment of fulfillment, it became evident that their prophecies were false (Ezekiel 33:21).

2. With the fall of Jerusalem, all the people realized that the false prophets sought only to please men and did not speak on behalf of God. Only Ezekiel remained as a faithful prophet. The people finally understood that there was a true prophet in their midst, someone who faithfully transmitted the message from the Lord. For this reason, they began to pay attention to his words (Ezekiel 33:30).

3. The people wanted to maintain their old habits when listening to the prophet—listening in the same way they listened to false prophets: only to appreciate pleasant words, like those who listen to well-sung songs or poems, but they had no inclination to put them into practice. It is precisely these vices and errors that God wants to remove from us. He wants to lead us to the reality of the church in Philadelphia, where the Word is not only heard, but also kept and practiced (Ephesians 4:14; Ezekiel 33:31).

4. "All our plans are confronted with God's will; if they are not aligned with it, beloved brothers and sisters, we can be sure that they will not prosper. God is the One who works all things according to the counsel of His will (Ephesians 1:11). Let us therefore seek to fulfill God's will; He Himself will take care of the rest" (Daily Food, book 10, week 4, Wednesday, p. 62).

THURSDAY

1. God has always desired to have a people who belonged exclusively to Him—who would do His will, obey His Word, and serve as instruments for the fulfillment of His purpose. Therefore, in His sovereignty, He provided that, through Joseph, a family of seventy people would go down to Egypt, where they would grow and multiply, living in the best part of that land (Genesis 12:1-2; 1 Peter 2:9).

2. From just seventy people, God formed a great nation. When the Israelites left Egypt, they numbered around two million. The Lord multiplied and strengthened them, demonstrating His power and wisdom. Through a situation that initially seemed tragic—Joseph's enslavement and suffering—God preserved Jacob's family, multiplied it, and transformed it into the nation of Israel (Genesis 46:27b; Exodus 1:9, 12, 19-20).

3. In the book of Exodus, Jacob's family already appears as a numerous nation, and in Numbers, this people is organized as an army prepared to advance. Therefore, God commanded Moses to conduct a census of all men twenty years of age and older who were fit for war, with a view to conquering Canaan. Similarly, the Lord desires that we advance to take possession of what He has entrusted to us. God seeks a people willing to fight for His will and to serve as His army in this generation (Numbers 1:3, 44; Psalm 110:3).

4. "God has a full plan for the salvation of man, and the vision of how necessary His work in us is must be very clear in order for Him to fulfill His will. The vision of God's will implies the renunciation of our freedom, for God needs to be your Lord and my Lord" (Hebrews 12:11) (Daily Food, book 10, week 4, Thursday, p. 63).

FRIDAY

1. God also commanded Moses to count the Levites. They were not included in the army of Israel because they had been set apart for priestly service and for the care of things related to the Lord. Similarly, today God needs different roles in His work. He needs those who go out into the streets to preach the gospel, as well as those who provide support, guidance, and care through the prophetic word. Just as in Israel, everyone has importance and a role in fulfilling God's purpose (Numbers 3:39).

2. The Lord continues to seek human resources for His work. His desire is to multiply divine life in people. That is why we are in the streets preaching the gospel, doing colportage, promoting the Life for All Institute, and reaching new hearts. This battle does not belong to men or to an organization; it belongs to the Lord. We only cooperate with Him (2 Chronicles 20:15, 17; 1 Samuel 17:47).

3. Our mission is to cooperate so that Christ may be the head over all things. For this reason, we persevere in preaching the gospel of the kingdom and spreading the Word. God needs willing people. During the years that Israel remained in Egypt, the family of seventy people multiplied until it became a great nation. In the same way, God continues to add people to His people to fulfill His eternal purpose (Ephesians 1:9-10; Psalm 110:3).

4. "If you have seen the vision of God's will, you have realized that this vision is composed of Christ and the church, not merely in a doctrinal way, but in a real way. You already understand that Christ desires to have primacy in your life" (Eph 1:9-10) (Daily Food, book 10, week 4, Friday, p. 65).

SATURDAY

1. God desires to have a people who belong exclusively to Him, a kingdom of priests and a holy nation. For this to be realized, people and resources are necessary. At that time, Israel was already a numerous people, but it did not yet possess a land in which to establish itself as a nation. Every nation needs territory to exercise its government and fulfill its purpose. Therefore, it was necessary to conquer the land that God had promised them (1 Peter 2:9; Deuteronomy 14:2; Genesis 13:14-17).

2. Satan, typified in Pharaoh, desires to keep men enslaved so that they expend their strength building his system. This is what happened to the Israelites in Egypt when they were forced to build the store cities of Pithom and Raamses. The Lord, however, desires to free us from every form of worldly bondage. Instead of producing bricks for the building of this passing world, God wants to transform us into living stones for His own spiritual building (Exodus 1:11-14; 1 Peter 2:5).

3. God had already made for Himself an exclusive people. It no longer made sense to remain in Egypt. It was time to leave slavery and take possession of the promised land. In the same way, the church today is God's people. The Lord desires to free us from everything that binds us to the world so that we can cooperate with His purpose and conquer territory for His kingdom. Let us move forward by faith and allow God to fulfill His will through us (Exodus 2:23-25).

4. "May we be pillars in the house of God, able to bear burdens; may we, in the midst of the great difficulties that have befallen us, be those who stabilize the church, those on whom God can count" (Romans 5:3-4) (Daily Food, book 10, week 4, Saturday, pp. 67-68).

SUNDAY

1. Nothing in Moses' story was a coincidence. God, beforehand, prepared three women to preserve his life: his mother, his sister, and Pharaoh's daughter. This shows us the importance of women in God's purpose, as they are used by the Lord for the preservation and propagation of life. It was also providential that Moses received the best education in Egypt, being prepared to lead the people of Israel, deliver them from slavery, and guide them through the wilderness (Exodus 2:1-10).

2. God needed to prepare His instrument for a great task: to liberate His people from Egypt. To this end, He equipped Moses with the best training available at the time, comparable in our day to that of the most renowned universities. This shows us that God can use properly prepared people as vessels to administer His work and serve His people according to His will (Acts 7:20-21).

3. A well-prepared person needs to be balanced. Moses was powerful in words and deeds. He not only knew how to speak, but also put into practice what he said. The Lord desires that His Word not remain merely in the realm of knowledge, but be lived and acted upon. Moses was prepared in this way, becoming an example of someone who combined training, practice, and obedience to God's purpose (Acts 7:22).

4. "The Lord wants to speak to us in a living way. When we have the living word, God begins to act. Sometimes He allows us to go through situations of weakness. Therefore, if you want to have more living experiences with the Lord, go out with the colporteurs on the street. Participate for a few days in the ACO and GPC and experience what it is like to reach your limit" (Genesis 32:23-24; 2 Corinthians 1:8-9) (Daily Food, book 10, week 4, Sunday, p. 71).
