

ULTRAREFINED IMMERSION IN THE PROPHETIC
WORD

Series: Genesis – Transformed to Reign

Message 48

The LORD Was with Joseph,
and Everything Prospered in His Hands

Bible Reading: Genesis 39:1-23



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MONDAY

1. The blessing that God bestowed upon man when He created him was fertility: fruitfulness and multiplication. His intention was to govern the Earth through man. However, with the fall, sin and death entered the world. Thus, God lost both man and the Earth, and could not establish His rule on Earth through man (Genesis 1:28).
2. Man sinned because he disobeyed God's word. After the fall, God needed to reclaim humanity and the Earth for Himself; therefore, Christ, man's descendant, would bless all the families of the Earth (Romans 5:19).
3. God found in Abraham someone who cared about His will and, through Him, established the way for man to become fruitful and multiply again. In the lineage of Jacob, Judah became important so that the promise of the descendant, Christ, would be fulfilled and man would once again become fruitful for God (Genesis 12:7; Galatians 3:16).
4. "Every time the Lord appeared to Abraham, He spoke to him. This is a great secret that we must learn. Without the word of God, nothing happens in our lives. When God appears and speaks to us, His word changes our fortune. Therefore, when the Lord speaks, we must believe, just as Abraham believed, and things began to happen in his life" (Acts 7:2) (Daily Food, book 7, week 3, Monday, pp. 39 and 40).

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TUESDAY

1. When Joseph was sold, God wanted him to be in Egypt, more specifically in Potiphar's house. God is sovereign: even if the situation seems disastrous and sad, He is in control. Does your life today have situations that seem hopeless? Do not lament what you are going through; even if everything seems negative, God remains in control (Genesis 37:36; 39:1).
2. Humans complain a lot, but the Lord wants what is best for you. Do not lament what you are going through; just be faithful to the Lord. He is with you. However, this is not because you were "chosen," but because you seek Him, closely follow His word, have fellowship with Him, and walk in the Spirit; you do not pursue personal ambitions or self-interest, but seek the Lord's will (Genesis 39:2).
3. Being sensible, humanly speaking, is one of the best qualities someone can have, because it involves thoughtfulness and balance in action. The Lord prepares us not only with these qualities, but also to be wise. This wisdom does not come from birth or from books, but from the Lord. To be wise, we need to walk closely with the Lord and His message for today (James 1:5; 3:17; Ephesians 5:15-16).
4. "The same happens to us. There are times in our lives, when haste overwhelms us, that we begin to want to "help" God, guided by our own wisdom, by the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. It was exactly at this point that Sarah found herself, for she could not have children, she was barren, but she had a human alternative at her disposal" (Genesis 16:1-2) (Daily Food, book 7, week 3, Tuesday, p. 43).

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WEDNESDAY

1. If you closely follow the Lord's words and put them into practice by obedience to His word, you can be sure that He will give you wisdom. The source of this wisdom is the Lord Himself with you. However, it is important that others see Him. It is not enough to say, "The Lord is with me," if this is not manifested in your life (Genesis 39:3; Isaiah 41:10).
2. It is no use saying, "The Lord is with me," without evidence. The proof lies in the fact that everything placed in your hands prospers—not because of your skill, but because the Lord acts. In truth, it is the Word itself that accomplishes the work. Therefore, your attitude toward God's word makes all the difference: listening attentively, diligently seeking it, and putting it into practice. Thus, the Lord's presence becomes evident, and there is prosperity (Matthew 6:33; Jeremiah 29:11).
3. Teenagers live in the context of loving the Word with reverence. They value its simplicity and seek it eagerly, like a deer longs for streams of water. Thus, they grow up in an environment that shapes them into sensible and wise people (Psalm 42:1).
4. "As for me, this is my covenant with you: You will be the father of many nations" (Genesis 17:1b-4). What did God mean here? That, on His side, the covenant is firm. He guarantees that Abraham will be the father of many nations. But the covenant involves obligation on both sides. And what about Abraham? What is his responsibility? The Lord makes it clear: the covenant will only be fulfilled if Abraham walks in the presence of God. Therefore, the human commitment is to walk in the presence of God" (Daily Food, book 7, week 3, Wednesday, p. 47).

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THURSDAY

1. In the Lord's hands, prudent and wise people prosper. Everything entrusted to them advances, for the Lord counts on them for His work. He seeks people who will manage well what is given to them in the house of God (Philippians 4:19; 2 Cor 9:8).
2. The steward acts as an administrator in any context. The same thing happens with us as with Joseph: as we grow in judgment and wisdom, the Lord entrusts us with greater responsibilities. Therefore, do not complain if you have little to do in the church; rather, fulfill with excellence what has already been entrusted to you. (Genesis 39:6).
3. Joseph started from the bottom: he was a slave and did everything his master commanded him. Similarly, those who are responsible do not reject simple tasks. Be faithful in little things. By demonstrating faithfulness in small matters, the Lord will place you in charge of greater things (Matthew 25:23).
4. "God desires that man walk in His presence. Just as the Lord set a condition for Abraham to receive the promise, namely, to walk in His presence, He also commanded the people of Israel to keep His word and obey it, as a condition for them to be His own possession (Exodus 19:5)" (Daily Food, book 7, week 3, Thursday, p. 48).

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FRIDAY

1. The steward of a house is responsible for the people who are in it. This involves caring for them, managing resources, and discerning their needs. The Lord trains us to reign, and to reign is to care for people. Have you exercised this care for those whom the Lord has entrusted to you? Have you been concerned about people? (1 Peter 5:7; Genesis 2:15).
2. We should not treat everyone the same way, for the Lord made us different; no one is the same as another. If there is no equality even in appearance, much less in soul. We are trained to manage God's house and, above all, to care for people. However, for this, it is necessary, first, to be faithful in the administration of the Lord's goods (1 Timothy 3:5).
3. God needs people who understand what is in His heart and are sensitive to His desire. When He speaks, we must be ready to respond. As His stewards, we need to practice what we hear. Have you been obeying promptly, or are you still slow to put into practice what the Lord says today? (1 Chronicles 11:17-18).
4. "The Lord Jesus told the disciples that the people were unwilling to repent because their hearts were hardened [...] (Matthew 13:14-15). This is the condition of uncircumcision of heart and ears, in which we too can fall if we trust in the capacity of the flesh. [...] What proves, in practice, the circumcision of the heart is the skill to hear and understand the voice of the Lord" (Daily Food, book 7, week 3, Friday, pp. 50-51).

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SATURDAY

1. I do not know how you react to situations: If you tend toward revenge or harbor resentment and bitterness, it does you no good. When these feelings persist, they reveal roots of bitterness that need to be uprooted. Therefore, let us always do good to one another and to everyone, no matter what they do to us. Whoever harbors resentment, loses joy, and cannot experience true satisfaction (1 Thessalonians 5:15-16).
2. Besides calling upon the name of the Lord and pondering His word, we have other tools: the energizing chamber, refined immersion, and the war cry. All of this helps us to pray without ceasing, for the Word is like a river of living water that leads us to the presence of the Lord. We also need to learn to give thanks in all circumstances. And you, have you been complaining before God? Let us not be like this. As long as we persist in murmuring, we remain trapped in the problem. (1 Thessalonians 5:17-18).
3. We cannot quench the Spirit. The secret to being filled with the Spirit is to speak God's word among ourselves, allowing it to circulate continually. Do not despise the word that God speaks through the prophets. It is what keeps us alive, gives meaning to our lives, brings direction, nourishes us, and empowers us to carry out God's work (1 Thessalonians 5:19-20).
4. "Many times, we want to do good, but we cannot, because we try to accomplish it by natural force. The secret is to allow the old man to die and the new man to live in newness of life, in resurrection. How does this work in practice? It is living in the spirit [...] The mind defines this inclination. It has decisive power. If it is placed on the spirit, we experience life and peace; if it is placed on the flesh, the result is death" (Romans 8:5-9) (Daily Food, book 7, week 3, Saturday, p. 52).

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SUNDAY

1. The steward has the responsibility of managing and disposing of the householder's wealth; he is the steward. It is his duty to take from what is in the pantry and provide for the members of the household, distributing according to need. The Lord appoints people to be responsible for His house and He needs you to manage His riches (Genesis 39:6).
2. Moses was faithful in all God's house as a servant, to bear witness to the things that were to be announced. Christ, however, is faithful as the Son over His own house. Here, He no longer speaks as a servant, but as the Son in His own house—and this house is us. The house of God has a mission: to preach the gospel of the kingdom to all the inhabited Earth (Numbers 12:6-7; Matthew 24:14).
3. The Lord needs a group of people who will remain in the stronghold of Zion, defending the kingdom. We defend it, propagate it, and expand it. May we be responsible in the house of the Lord, firm pillars, persevering and constant in our life with God. Even if we face difficult situations, like Joseph in prison, let us remain faithful to serve the Lord. (Genesis 39:23; Psalm 14:7).
4. "We need, on the one hand, to take off the clothes of the old man; and, on the other, to put on the new man, created according to God. The practical way to do this is by being renewed in the spirit of our minds through the washing of water by the word (Eph 5:26)" (Daily Food, book 7, week 3, Sunday, p. 54).

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
